The Galena Park Independent School District is located east of Houston. It encompasses the incorporated cities of Galena Park, Jacinto City, and a portion of Houston as well as a large area of unincorporated Harris County.

Within the district, serving a population of approximately 22,000, there is one early childhood center, 15 elementary schools (K-5), one sixthgrade school, two middle schools (6-8), two middle schools (7-8), six high schools (two 9-12, one 9, one 10, and one 11-12) including an Early College High School and an Accelerated Center for Education. The district also provides a PEP Child Development Center, a Center for Success, and a Community Night School and participates in a Multi-District Alternative School.

Located just 25 miles from downtown Houston, Galena Park is surrounded by four community colleges and five four-year colleges or universities.

A Profile of Galena Park High School

Galena Park High School was established in 1928 when its name was changed from Clinton High School.

Two years later, Galena Park ISD was formed. In 1947, GPISD opened Dement Field to serve the athletic needs, and with the continued growth of the district, a new larger high school building was opened on March 17, 1950. In 2004, the school was remodeled, adding three new buildings and technology updates.
