Choose your path and get started today.

- 1 year certificate
- 2 year associate's degree
- "Basics" then transfer
- 4 year bachelor's degree
- Graduate school/professional school

Hidden (and not so hidden) costs of senior year

- Application fees: \$50-\$75 per college (fee waivers)
- 3rd or 4th ACT/SAT Test/Sending Scores:
 \$50 per test and \$13 per score
- AP tests or dual credit classes: \$25 per test,
 \$50 per class
- Class ring, letterman jacket, patches, yearbook, invitations, pictures, and cap & gown: \$1,000+

TOTAL: \$2,300+

Hidden (and not so hidden) costs of senior year

- Cords, banquet/interview outfits and costs: \$100+
- Prom (outfit, ticket, parking, pictures): \$400-\$800
- Transcripts (and other old fines): \$10-\$50
- Housing Deposit and Orientation: \$300+ (fee waiver possible--but not always)

TOTAL: \$2,300+

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Dream--Choose 1 or 2 schools you WISH for **Match**--Choose 1 or 2 schools you have exact scores

Over-Match--Choose 2 schools for which you have better scores than they require (more likely to get money)

- selective schools more likely to offer money
- Can be rejected from your major
- MORE THAN SIX=BAD IDEA
 - After you complete the application, colleges send you a LONG to-do list. You will not be able to keep up with the paperwork for too many schools.

Variety of selectivity (how hard it is to get in)--less

What if my child wants to go away from home for college?

- If you can afford it (or get fee waivers), let them apply; evaluate the financial aid offer.
- Discuss as a family: How far is too far away? Flight vs Drive
- Why do they want to go? Does this college offer more? Is it better for their major?
- Research the school (and other options)

- What to do now to get on track for your chosen
- Path: High school certificate
 Learn all you can about the certification requirements
- and test; study

 Talk to recruiters about options (reserves vs active duty)
- and jobs; study for the ASVAB
 Path: Community college degree or certificate
 - Research the HUGE number of options for courses of study and different degree/certification plans; study for the TSIA (Accuplacer app, online material)
- Path: Community college transfer
 Research both the community college and the
 - university you plan to attend; know which courses will transfer and only plan to take those; find out about transfer scholarships; prepare for the TSIA (Accuplacer app, online material); take dual credit courses

Make sure you sign up for REMIND

By <u>September</u> (December for community college)

- Get required ACT (TSIA) test scores for university
- Write college applications and have them proofread before submitting
- Create three scholarship-ready essays about your obstacles, family life, and education goals

Timeline continued

- Note: For college, deadline is NOT when you turn it in!
- **EARLY** is best!

- OCTOBER
 - Apply for FAFSA or TASFA
 - Join PTA (Scholarship opportunities)
- EACH MONTH OF SENIOR YEAR
 - Apply for at least 8 scholarships
 - Check your application portal to-do list weekly
 - Check email daily
 - Follow up on financial aid
 - Ask lots of questions

- Terms you need to know when researching colleges
- CREDIT HOURS (like credits in high school)The time spent in a course per week (usually 3
 - hours)

 A full-time student takes 12 hours (4 classes)

DEGREE PLAN AND COURSE NUMBERS

- A degree plan outlines the courses required to complete a certificate or degree
- Course numbers are assigned to classes and vary from college to college (ENGL 1301)
 - Texas Common Numbering System to compare two Texas colleges' course numbers

Terms you need to know when researching colleges (continued)

BASICS OR CORE CURRICULUM

- To earn a degree, you will take high school over again (English, math, art, etc.)
- Will vary by college and major--see degree plans for details.

FULL NEED MET

This college will meet all need beyond your family's EFC (Expected Family Contribution)--meaning all you would have to pay is the EFC.
